


Coordinator's Corner

Brown Bag Show and Tell

Those of you who were at the October meeting will no doubt remember Larry's Brown Bag Show and Tell. He showed us the fruiting bodies of three really interesting plants and we tried to guess what they were. Although he didn't have all the botanical names at the time, he very kindly sent them to be included in our newsletter.

Do you recognize this fruit?



There are three kinds:

- Capital Pear (Pyrus calleryana "capital")
- Chantecleer Pear (Pyrus calleryana "Chantecleer")
- Redspire Pear (Pyrus calleryana "Redspire")

The Redspire is the one Larry and Eloise have in their garden.

How about this fruit?



This tree is a living fossil and the world's oldest known tree. Pollution and pest resistant, this is Larry's boulevard tree. It turned out to be female. The books say that a female Ginkgo is undesirable because the fruit smells badly. None of us could detect any bad smell from the fruit.

3. Some of us thought this last one was a physalis or ground cherry.



This plant turned out to be an Eloise experiment which attracted a lot of attention. The photo below shows the arrangement of the seeds. This plant is in the Sapindaceae or soapberry family which includes lychees and rambutan. Ground cherries or physalis are in the solanaceae family, along with Datura, belladonna, paprika and tomatoes.



Answers:

- 1. Ornamental pear Poirier Ornamental (Pyrus calleryana "Redspire")
- 2. Maidenhair tree (Ginkgo biloba)
- 3. Love-in-a-Puff (Cardiospermum Halicacabum)
